

"If I could go back to my first month of classes, I would reassure myself that I would find support and a place of acceptance," says Mikayla Edy-Lizuck. Enrolled in the Psychiatric Nursing advanced diploma program, the First Nations student says it was that welcoming spirit and "seeing Sask Polytech's value of Indigenous heritage" that drew her to the polytechnic.

"Every month, we receive a calendar, via email, with events, education, courses and gatherings offered to Indigenous students. It includes smudge ceremonies, traditional food, beading, Cree language courses and more." Mikayla says she appreciates that these activities "show the effort in continuing our teachings, culture and our vocal histories."

Mikayla says her biggest challenge was juggling her studies and a complicated pregnancy in her first year. "My program faculty worked with me to guide and support me successfully through year one." With the assistance of the Indigenous student advisor, she also applied for—and received—student awards and bursaries, which reduced some of her financial pressure.
