Lorne McConaghy's gift to Sask Polytech supporting education and innovation in agriculture

Lorne McConaghy, a dedicated farmer from Melfort, Saskatchewan, has generously committed \$100,000 to Saskatchewan Polytechnic's Time to Rise campaign. His gift will directly support the construction of the new Saskatchewan Polytechnic, Joseph A. Rемаi Saskatoon Campus. This significant contribution reflects his belief in the power of education and its role in advancing the agricultural industry.

"Agriculture has given so much to me and my family, and I believe in giving back to help train the next generation of skilled technicians. Saskatchewan Polytechnic plays a vital role in preparing students for the future, and I'm proud to support this project that will benefit our province for years to come," said McConaghy.

In recognition of his generosity, Saskatchewan Polytechnic will name a primary classroom, the McConaghy Family Agricultural Equipment Technician Classroom, after the new campus opens. Until the new campus opens, his support will be recognized at the current Saskatoon main campus within the Agriculture Equipment Technician program area. McConaghy's gift not only strengthens education but also ensures the future of skilled agricultural technicians in Saskatchewan.





Building on a family legacy

Continuing the Mertler family's impact on carpentry students at Saskatchewan Polytechnic

After George Mertler's passing in 2012, his wife Ann sought a way to honour his distinguished woodworking career and lifelong mentorship of carpentry students. She established the Ann and George Mertler Bursary at Saskatchewan Polytechnic to support full-time carpentry students. Ann funded the bursary through annual contributions, and even after her passing in 2016, her legacy continued through a portion of her stock portfolio, providing financial assistance to students in need.

Their son, Gord Mertler, is carrying this legacy forward by including a planned gift in his will, ensuring ongoing support for future students. "The Mertler legacy is what's important to me," he says. By continuing this tradition, Gord not only honours his parent's generosity, but also encourages others to consider bursary contributions to give back. With financial aid often making the difference between completing a program or withdrawing, the Mertler family's dedication ensures students can focus on their education and, in turn, pay it forward to their communities.

Fostering CHANGE

Strengthening Indigenous student support
at Saskatchewan Polytechnic





Suncor Energy Foundation has supported the wītōkamāhtōtān Indigenous Student Success initiative at Saskatchewan Polytechnic. This initiative aims to address the systemic challenges that Indigenous students face in accessing and completing postsecondary education.

The wītōkamāhtōtān initiative—which means “helping each other” in Cree—is designed to enhance the recruitment, retention and success of Indigenous students. The funding supports key initiatives that reduce financial barriers and foster meaningful connections with Indigenous communities.

Key components of this initiative:

- **Expanding student support through the Wchitowin Transition Program (WTP):** The WTP, previously a summer transition program, will now be a year-long initiative providing academic, cultural and personal support to Indigenous students.
- **Reducing barriers through financial assistance:** A new Tuition Deposit Assistance initiative will help Indigenous students overcome financial challenges, making post-secondary education more accessible.
- **Strengthening Indigenous student spaces and community connections:** Investments in Indigenous Students' Centres and culturally relevant support services will create a welcoming environment, fostering belonging and success for Indigenous learners.

Saskatchewan Polytechnic and Suncor Energy Foundation demonstrate a shared commitment to reconciliation and inclusive education. By investing in Indigenous student success, Suncor Energy Foundation is not only supporting individual learners but also helping build stronger Indigenous communities and a more diverse workforce that benefits Saskatchewan's economy.

RISING TO MEET SASKATCHEWAN'S GROWING ECONOMY

The Time to Rise campaign, launched in spring 2024, aims to raise \$100M for a new state-of-the-art Saskatchewan Polytechnic campus in Saskatoon. Located at Innovation Place, the new campus will modernize learning spaces, increase program capacity, and create Canada's first post-secondary education and research hub of its kind.

Major campaign contributions include:

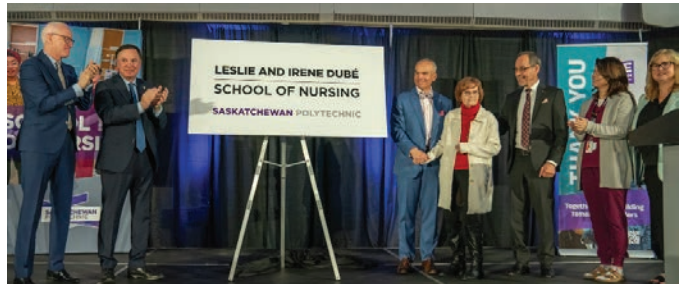
Nutrien's \$15M gift, the largest corporate gift in Sask Polytech's history, led to renaming the School of Mining, Manufacturing and Engineering Technologies to the Nutrien School of Mining, Manufacturing and Engineering Technologies.



Joseph A. Remail's \$25M gift, the largest gift to Sask Polytech, resulted in the naming of the new campus to the Joseph A. Remail Saskatoon Campus.



Leslie and Irene Dubé's \$7.5M gift, announced during National Nursing Week, led to the naming of the Leslie and Irene Dubé School of Nursing.



Cenovus Energy’s \$2.5M gift to the Time to Rise campaign directly supports the construction of the new Joseph A. Rемаi Saskatoon Campus. In recognition, the chemical technology lab, power engineering technology lab and instrumentation lab will be renamed the Cenovus Energy Labs.



In August 2024, provincial leaders and Saskatchewan Polytechnic faculty, students and employees gathered to break ground on the new Saskatchewan Polytechnic, Joseph A. Rемаi Saskatoon Campus. Premier Scott Moe reaffirmed the government’s \$200M commitment, initially announced in 2023.
